Not new but impressive as ever is the Blackburn Beverley, a giant among transport planes. Despite the fact that it carries a 22-ton pay load the Beverley can take off \$\frac{1}{22}\$ 800-yards

Aircraft from the same stable are Munter single seater fighters. / Also used by the airforces of Denmark, Holland and Sweden.

The amazing little Folland Gnat. Said to be about one-third the weight of conventional fighter planes. It has an exceptionally high rate of roll.

Another Hunter, Amminiment formidably armed with 24 rockets.

Now, a Hunter carrying Fairey Fireflash air-to-air guided weapons.

You don 't expect aerobatics from helicopters, but the Bristol Type 173 doesn't see why not. It has two 520 horse percentage and can carry 27 passengers, Mone aboard, now, thankyou very much.

The Saunders Skeeter, a two-seater for army light liaison many a civillian's mouth water. No toy, it can touch 100 months.

The Majestic Vulcan, a four-jet Delta wing, now entering squadron service in Bomber Command. Vulcans have flown higher than mamman 50,000-feet at just a fraction below the speed of sound.... The parachute brake cuts down the landing run.

The Fairey Delta-2. Last March Peter Twiss flew the first prototype at 1,132 m.p.h., the official world speed record.... Well, that's something of Farnborough; smmething to offer the aviation world.

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
