The scenes from Graz are typical of what happened all over the country when, the face of Europe was changed ---- when Austria lost her independence, and became a state of the German Reich in a swift and spectacular coup by Hit, ler.

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Later, in Linz and Salzburg, the appearance of the swastika made it clear that there was to be no armed resistance to the oncoming German troops, and soon the streets echoed to the tramp of marching foet --- the Army, and Brown shirts and Black Shirt guards. The Seventh Army Corps from Munich moved on to the and to occupy strategic positions throughout Austria. In the streets of the capital --- in Vienna --- there were scenes of enthusiasm, and from the balcony the of the Chamcellery Dr Seyss-Inquart, the man appointed by Hitler, Selected in answer to the greetings of the crowd. At night, along the famous Ringstrasse, a torchlight procession marched . In one night the city that once had /been the capital of a great empire became a provincial town of Germany.

What is our position in Britain to-day?
