Emblazoned with the arms of Scotland, a Royal Train draws into Princes Street Station, Edinburgh, bringing Scotland's Queen and her husband - for their Coronation visit.

Waiting to greet the Royal Party is Sir James Miller, the Lord Provost - for the time-honoured ceremony of handing over the keys of the "good town of Edinburgh". In traditional manner, the Queen returns them, "being perfectly convinced that they cannot be placed in better hands"

and there are flowers, too, for the Queen, presented by Lady Miller. Now the Queen, escorted by Lt General Bamber inspects the guards of honour, the Scots Greys, in the ceremonial unit - as they march to the Palace.

Leaving the Station, the Queen enters her Royal Coach - to be drawn by four Windsor Greys. The Queen wins every loyal heart - dressed in a blue coat and bonnet-shaped white hat. The Duke of Edinburgh in the uniform of Admiral of the Fleet, wears the green sash of the Thistle.

And though the City on the Hill is shadowed by morning mist - it's a brilliant moment for the welcoming thousands who line the Royal Mile to the Palace & the Guard House.

The State Visit to Scotland has begun. Leading the homecoming of a newly-crowned Queen are the Royal Scots Greys - a brave sight in their scarlet tunics and plumes. Behind them follow the Lord Lyon King of Arms and his Court. The Royal Coach is preceded by The Divisions of the Sovereign Escort of the Household Cavalry. Arriving at Holyrood Palace, the Queen

is greeted by the people - straight for the hearts of the loyal subjects of her ancestral Scottish home. In the forecourt of the Palace, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders (in full-dress uniform) are drawn up to provide the Guard of Honour.

At the West Door of St. Giles' - the Queen and the Duke are received by the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland and the Dean of the ^{Thistle} Chapel Royal

Then, led by her Majesty's Chaplains, and the Heralds, the ^{husband} Queen and her / ~~Royal Visitors~~ make their way to the Royal Pew

The Queen watches - as the Duke of Hamilton hands the Crown to the Dean of the Thistle ~~and Chapel Royal~~ - who places it between the Sword and the Sceptre - on the Holy Table.

^{As the} Solemn moment, as the Lord Lyon and the Dean ~~of the Chapel Royal~~ conduct the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh to the Sanctuary.

Then the Dean blesses the Queen, before the Benediction is pronounced by the Moderator.

The Service over - the Dean hands Scotland's Regalia to the Queen, who returns them to their Hereditary Bearers.

The Crown of Scotland ~~is taken from the Holy Table and handed to the Queen~~ The Duke of Hamilton kneels before the Queen - and receives this symbol of Majesty.
