The Royal Air Force is on parade at Odiham, Hampshire. Planes old and new. The men who fly them, and those who keep them flying. For this their product hour - the Coronation Review by Her Majesty the Queen (accompanied by the Duke) pays tribute (on behalf of us all) to great achievements that during eighteen tremendous years. Days of heroic fighter defence. Of unspering bomber attack and conseless coestel vigil. And now - The Jet Age Members of the W.R.A.F. are inspected, too, proudly watched by their Commandant - the Duchess of Gloucester.

The Duchess of Kent, too, who husband lost his life during war-time service. But the RAF.

The inspection over, the Queen's Colour (escorted by a Colour Party and
Escort Squadron) is paraded - followed by nearly twelve hundred men and
women of the Service - as they march past their Commander-in-Chief SOUND
The programme in the afternoon of the Royal Salute by the huge
parade SOUND

Then (driving in an open car) the Queen and the Duke, (proudly wearing his Service wings) tour the long lines of parked aircraft. 318 planes of twenty-three different types - graduating from tiny Chipmunk trainers (in which the Duke learned to fly) to giant Superfortresses.

And row - The whine of jets- Gloster Meteor Fighters.

The Canberra- a twin-jet bomber Sabres - of Canadian Squadrons

And lastly, the R.A.F. of the future:-

The "Victor" - Britain's newest bomber I taken off the secret

And the "Vulcan" - leading the delta-winged craft.

So - init in only eighteen years - the R.A.F. has become a great Force flying high - in the Service of Queen and Country.
