The Duke of Norfolk declared the innings closed at 204 for six ~~runs~~ - leaving the visitors two-and-a-half hours to make the runs.

And to their credit - the Duke of Edinburgh's side made a brave effort to get them... The Duke, himself, hit three boundaries, in a merry knock of eighteen. ² Though he was missed once - by a ^{quick} ~~long~~ throw-in. /

The Duke was finally bowled by George Cox of Sussex. The Duke of Norfolk's eleven won by seven runs, but the best total of all was well over £2,000 for a worthy organisation. /

There was hectic sport, too, at Brands Hatch, Kent, where sixty famous ~~Formula F1~~ drivers burned up the track in ten races for baby cars...

All the thrills were there - from massed starts - to single cars cornering at break-neck speeds ³. /

E. Lewis Evans in his Cooper (No. 43) was placed in both the principal races, which were won by Don Parker in a Kieft. /

A record crowd ~~_____~~ watched the events - including a demonstration run by veteran racing cars. ~~_____~~

~~_____~~ The oldest car competing was a 1905 Rolls Royce. The winner was a Sunbeam - driven by J. Sears. ¹ The prize was Double-X spirit - enough to revive any veteran. /

Two crowded days of athletics, when Great Britain met France at the White City. The start of the Three Miles. Record-breaker Gordon Pirie and Freddy Green (in white vests) running for Britain.

Soon after the start - Pirie shoots ahead...

And he comes home alone - winning by eighty yards from Green - in 13 minutes 36.4 seconds. A time that shattered all his own records, and was only four seconds slower than the world record. /
