Others suggest the Motor Coach of the future

All eyes on the Delta-Wing Avro Vulcans, as they fly in formation. A familiar shape now is the Handley-Page Victor bomber- with swept-back wings. But no show is complete, without the faster-than-sound fighters, the Hawker Hunter

And as the Farnborough Show opens, Neville Duke-(in a Hawker Hunter) flashes along the South Coast, in a further effort to smash the world air-speed record. Mrs Duke watches from the beach, as her husband comes in for another record-beating run.

So, as the Hunter with Duke at the controls, taxis in to Tangmere aerodrome, we were yet to learn the official figures, which beat all previous speeds,- his average 727.6 miles an hour.
