"A corner of a foreign field? The Airborne Cemetery at Costerbeek, in Holland, where at a Memorial Service, they remember men of the First Airborne Division who dropped from the skies - nine years ago. They had come to hold the Rhine bridge at Arnhem and bring liberation. To-day, the children of Arnhem tend their graves, for the "Red Devils" lie among friends - cherished and remembered. In the Square, near Arnhem Church, a monument has been erected - which Queen Juliana now comes to unveil. A memorial to the Men of Arnhem - to every British sergiceman and Dutch patriot who died as brothers-in-arms

And Queen Juliana places her own token to their memory at the foot of the hallowed Shrine.

so that Holland should regain her cherished freedom,

relatives and comrades of the fallen made the pilgrimage moving in solemn procession to the Airborne Division's own Memorial on Arnham Bridge.

the man who led the "Red Devils" in that valiant action pays his tribute to their bravery. For out of the stark heroism and courage was born the true value of airborne operation. And now, on the minth anniversary, the Territorial Army launches its biggest airborne exercise since the war, as men of the 44th Parachute Brigade drop over a Norfolk training area.

Flown in by American flying-box-cars; over twelve hundred men make the drop. Object of the Exercise was to descend behind "enemy lines" mixet before a powerful Infantry attack - causing disorganisation in the rear areas, And, so in the archer spice, to sales and horse sever ordering
