The Quen spoke for ten minutes and then, after bowing to the Assembly, she walked from the Chamber - pausing to present the Copy of the Address to the Speaker of the House, Sir Matthew Oram.

Soon - this Parliament celebrates its centenary - a hundred years of history that has guided a young country to Nationhood. But to New Zealand, this brief session will remain its most cherished memory.
