Her Royal Highness, who had become a V.A.D. at the beginning of World
War I, and has been Commandant-in-Chief of the British Red Cross Society
since 1926, had come to present new Colours to the Glasgow Branch.

The Colours are embroidered by members of the Royal School of Needlework
in London, and were bought by funds/raised ^{generously} by officers and members of the
Branch. The great work done by the Society was recently recognised by
a local benefactor- himself disabled in the 1914-18 war- who ~~presented~~
~~as gift~~ gave £25,000 to the Glasgow Red Cross.

Later in Blythswood Square, the Princess Royal took the salute at a
colourful march-past by the Men's and Women's Detachments and many cadet
units,-- about 600 strong.
