Canada: Duke's Tour continues

Canada: Leaving Vancouver - the R.C.A.F. Constellation, carrying the Duke of Edinburgh, headed North - bound for the fabulous gold-rush territory of the Yukon...

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The first stop was at White Horse, which the great rush to the Klondike Gold Fields in 1898 - transformed overnight into a boom town... And the Duke took a trip in one of the veterans of those hectic days, the stern-wheeler Klondike, which carried prospectors up river - in search of golf.

To-day, the search is for uranium, and the Duke visited the second largest source in the world at Port Radium, just south of the Arctic circle, and examined some of the precious metal used in atomic energy production. At Coppermine, in the Arctic ocean - the Duke became the first member of the Royal Family to visit the community.

And at Yellowknife, a mining centre and trading postmon the Great Slave Lake - the Duke joined the youngsters in eating Buffalo Burghers - a local delicacy.

At the debugger Research Centre, Prince Philip watched the speed of missiles in flight being measured - a baseball thrown by **Atom Prince Commander Michael Parker.** The Duke's throw was recorded at 51.8 miles per hour.
