The climax of the bicentennial celebrations came, next day, with a solemn convocation at the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine.

Among the forty-eight distinguished international figures honoured <sup>LD</sup> were the Queen Mother, and Dr. Adenauer, the West German Chancellor, who each received the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws.

Most brilliant function of the New York visit was the gala Commonwealth Ball, when Commonwealth Ex-Servicemen were proud to form the Guard of Honour for the Queen Mother. Her Majesty was wearing the Order of the Garter.
