## Air News: Rescue by helicopter

ONDON: BEFORE SEEING A HELICOPTER RESCUE, WE GO TO Transport and Civil Aviation, watched the demonstration of a series for reducing helicopter noise - a silencer - which is fitted to the exhaust pipe.

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adapted helicopter - a Westland "Whirlwind" took off on a trial flight After the test, listeners declared that the usual roar was reduced to a soft purr. Good news, indeed, for those who live and work on London's "helicopter highway"

At Gosport, a new helicopter life-saving device - the scoop net for air-see rescue - is attached, - ready for demonstration by its inventor -THE Lt. Commander John Sproule, C.O. of a Search and Rescue Unit, at Ford, Sussex.

Meanwhile, an icy ducking awaits a Wren Officer and two Naval Air Ratings who are going to be fished from the Solent.

The test is on - and there's Second Officer Leta Ridley, a volunteer, who jumped into the water from a Naval launch.

The net (attached to a tubular frame) is lowered by winch, and trawled through the water until the victim is scooped up.

The catch is hauled up and the rescued person can either enter the cabin, or (if seriously injured) remain in the het until the helicopter lands. Will The scoop net is we be issued to all aircraft-carriers and Maval Air Stations.
