After a twelve mile ride from Kangston with Sir Hugh Foot, the Governor, the Princess (wearing a baue and white dress) was acclaimed by thousands of loyal islanders at Spanish Town, (once the capital of Jamaica in the days of Spanish Rule).

A balcony-appearance was the signal for a tremendous ovation, and Spanish Town voiced its welcome with flowers.

On the next day, the Princess joined 2 West Indian annualization; congregation of 2000 in prayer at the Cathedral in Spanish Town, where she was received by Dr Dale, Iord Bishop of Jamaica.

Dr Dale said that Her Royal Highness's visit- as President of the Church of England Youth Council- had inspired and encouraged hundreds

of young people in Jamaica.
