With the outbreak <sup>in</sup> of the last war, his brilliant leadership as Commander Destroyer of a Flotilla, soon won him recognition. In 1941, ~~as Captain~~ <sup>He WAS AWARDED</sup> Mountbatten, ~~he received~~ the D.S.O. for bringing two crippled destroyers back to port....a fine feat of seamanship.

One of the crippled destroyers was H.M.S. Kelly - which <sup>later</sup> fought many gallant actions before being sunk, under Earl Mountbatten, ~~at~~ during the evacuation of Crete. /

~~His inspiring leadership brought further promotion.~~ The next year, he became Chief of Combined Operations - organising many daring raids.

~~His~~ meteoric rise continued, and in South-east Asia (as the youngest Supreme Allied Commander of the War,) Earl Mountbatten visited the Chindit training base of war hero - General Orde Wingate.
