Eastbourne - an R.A.F. Sunderland Flying Boat suddenly nose-dived and crashed into the sea. Small launches raced out to lend a hand in rescue operations, and were later joined by service helicopters that flew in from nearby coastal stations. The "Sunderland" was bringing visitors for the R.A.F. Association's Silver Jubilee Conference that was being held in the town - and crashed while coming in to land. After ten surivors had been picked up by rescue craft, the Eastbourne lifeboatmen passed hawsers around the stricken plane and towed it nearer the shore. An all-hends-on-dack manoeuvre that gave holiday-makers the chance to share in the operation. The machine sank so quickly that only ten of the fourteen people on board managed to scramble clear - and frogmen were flown in from Gosport to seanch the wreckage, 

the Sunderland. The ten survivors were rushed, by ambulance, to hospital - after an unexplained flying draws on the South Coast.
