

At Greenock, a tender takes the first passengers out to a proud new Cunarder, the "Ivernia" - for her maiden woyage to Quebec and Montreal. The liner should have sailed from Liverpool; but owing to the dock strike (now happily ended) the passengers (including many emigrants sailing to start a new life in Canada) were brought to the Clyde. for these young travellers, it was "All Aboard" - and the gangway severed the last link with their Scottish homeland. Altogether, there were over nine hundred passengers on board. The Ivernia is the second of four Cumarders - destined for the Canadian service. And the interior decorations (seen here in the Country Cousins lounge) features this association with the Dominion. // another attractive setting is the Lace Room, where lengths of exquisite sheets of lace - sandwiched between perspex - form the partitions.
