At Winchester - the ancient Saxon Capital of England - the youngest citizens led the welcome to the Queen and her husband, on the Pilgrims' School Playing Field.

At Winchester College, founded over five hundred years ago, Her Majesty presented Queen's Medals to three of the prefects.

And won the cheers of the whole school when she requested that six extra days be added to their holiday.

One of the occasions of the visit was the 800th anniversary of the granting of two Royal Charters. And, at the Guildhall, the Mayor, Coun.

Mrs Thackeray tendered the Mace to the Queen.

A symbolic "declaration of continued allegiance" that was followed by a bouquet, of chains blooms.

Her Majesty inspected the two Charters (granted by King Henry the Second, in 1155) and accepted a carved oak Table for the Royal Children.

During the efternoon, the Queen attended the anniversary celebrations of the founding of the King's Royal Rifle Corps, in America, two hundred years ago.

After inspecting the parade - composed of four companies and Old Comrades, Her Majesty, as their Colonel-in-Chief - took the Salute at the march-past Again, with rifles at the trail, the Corps passes in double time - a jealously-guarded tradition
