Copenhagen--- During his visit to Denmark, the Duke of Edinburgh undertook something dear to his heart- an inspection of British Yachts moored in the Friederiksholm Canal.

On his way home from Copenhagen, the Duke flew to Soest in Germany, to present new Colours (on behalf of the Queen) to the 2nd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment.

This was the first presentation of colours to a Canadian unit on foreign soil, and the first to this Regiment since <sup>IT WAS FORMED</sup> ~~its inception~~ 56 years ago.

Watched by some 5000 Canadians stationed in Germany, the Regiment paid tribute to <sup>ITS</sup> ~~their~~ Royal Colonel-in-Chief.

Back in London, the Duke of Edinburgh attended a Meeting of the Council of the Cinematograph Exhibitors Association.
