## Duke unveils R.A.F. MEmorial

Arriving in York on a day of R.A.F. Remembrance, the Duke of Edinburgh first boured the railway carriage workshops in the City.

Then - a solemn pilgrimage into York Minster - where the Duke unveiled a Memorial to Commonwealth and Allied Airmen. The Memorial takes the form of an astronomical clock and commonwealth eighteen thousand airmen, who died while operating from airfields in Yorkshire, Durham and Morthamkarian Northumberland, during the last war.
