Avalanche

From Yugoslavia comes the first news of disaster following Europe's unprecedented Arctic conditions. A sudden rise in temperature, in the Mount Alrab area, causes an avalanche, with fifty casualties, many of them fatal.

A rescue column from the town of Gostiver battled through adverse conditions to the entombed villages. Many survivors had to be carried long distances before they could be despatched for hospital treatment. With their houses smashed or completely buried, the homeless (many with young children) are taken to reception areas. Refugees from the aftermath of winter.
