Next day, it was the turn of the R.A.F. Station, Odiham, to play host to the Royal Visitor. Wearing the uniform of an Air Vice-Marshal, the King inspected many different types of service-aircraft.

After seeing for himself the cargo-capacity of a Beverley freighter, King Feisal showed great interest in modern jet fighters, the Hunter, the Vampire, and the all-weather fighter that recently hit the headlines - the Javelin.

After lunch came a visit to the Control Tower to watch a massed fly-past arranged in his honour.
