Driving through cheering crowds, a visit was made to an airfield site - the base for a new guided-missile range in the area, The gift of a length of hand-woven Royal Stuart tartan was the island's grateful giftxtaxthatex arrivations thank-offering to their Sovereign All too soon, the Royal Party was returning by barge to the "Britannia" while the strains of "will ye no come back again" testified to the success of their visit. Charles and Princess Anne watched from "Britannia," the ceremony of to visit there greeting for the first Reigning Monarch for over fifty years, During their stay, the Queen and the Duke yatted Stornoway's

ful-curing station, where fisher girls with nimble fingers, were gutting herring at the rate of 25 a minute.

Another visit was made to a mill - which brought grateful Royal acceptance of a gift of world-famous Harris tweed . which is made extensively in the side.


Later, the Queen and the Duke rejoined the Royal children, who had already spent an exciting time at the Tiumpan Head Lighthouse, their first public function alone.
