

After enjoying a family week-end at Windsor Castle, the Queen and the Royal Children, accompanied by the Duke of Edinburgh to London Airport - to see him off on his four-months tour.

Following the official leave-taking, the Royal Party went aboard the B.O.A.C. Argonaut Airliner to bid the Duke "God Speed" and a safe return from some 35,000 miles of world travel.

This is the first major Commonwealth Tour the Duke has made without the Queen, ~~and in the following days~~, He was flying to Mombasa, on the first stage of his journey to Melbourne - to open the Olympic Games.
