The Duke in New Guinea



## 20th November 1956

Gliding through tropical waters, the Boyal Yacht "Britannia" nears the peaceful, palm-fringed shores of New Guinea. There, a warm island welcome awaited the Duke of Edinburgh - making his Olympic Year visit to Australia.

At Port Moresby, the service-medals of the Guard of Honour reminds us that war once raveged these islands. While the welcoming Governor-General of Australia can be recognised as Field Marshal Sir Williem Slim. Arriving at the time of Commonwealth remembrance - the Duke was to learn something of those degrees war-years - when Australia herself was threatened. And with brave members of the Papua and New Guinea Volunteers Rifles (advance scouts in the Allied campaign) he paid XXXXXXX tribute to New Guinea, Australian and British fallen at Lae War-Cemetery. The eagerly-awaited Hoyal Visit was marked by celebrations, too, especially when His Royal Highness attended a review of over five thousand natives.
