

The Suez crisis has revealed Britain's vital dependence on the once-humble oil tanker - so here's a welcome ^{ADDITION} ~~additional~~ to our rapidly-growing fleet.

A 32,000 ton vessel, she was built at Wallsend-on-Tyne - where shipyard workers are making final preparations for her launching ceremony.

The runways are thoroughly greased - and the ^{SURPLUS} ~~surplus~~ burned off to ensure a smooth passage to the water.

On the launching platform, Lady McMillan, wife of the Chancellor, performed the ceremony, and with the traditional blessing, the "British Valour" moved down to the River Tyne.

When completed, the "British Valour" will join the largest British oil fleet to sail under a single-house-flag. Though not spectacular in size- (there are now tankers of sixty thousand tons on order), ^{SHE} ~~the vessel~~ sets a new mark in oil transport. For with a speed of eighteen knots, she is claimed to be Britain's fastest tanker.

Meanwhile, in Port Said, the Arab Town has been sealed off to prevent further attacks during the Allied withdrawal.
