

And now --- to bring the record right up to date --- we have this visit by Prince Philip to a plant, at South Morden, of one of the great dairy companies. He watched, first of all, the process of cleaning the empties.

How does the bottle get filled? This is the machine that does it. Experts explained to the royal visitor, the workings of the various ingenious machines that ensure that the milk is bottled and capped -- untouched by ~~any~~ hand.

After filling, they are swirled about in trays in a sort of ballet of the bottles -- for distribution to the army of roundsmen who take them to the consumers. During his tour of the plant ~~the~~ Prince Philip chatted to one employe who has driven a milk-tanker over a million miles.

A couple of days later Prince Philip went to Cornwall and worked the water pump at a tin mine.
