HAMBURG RANDERED.

One of the greatest serial steries of the war, the battering of Hamburg. By night and day the big German city was subjected to Allied Air assaults without parallel in history. As each of the British might attacks was made, an away of between five and six thousand R.A.F. flyers were in the air over Hamburg within an hour? With ground crows, that means around a hundred-thousand men engaged in each night's offensive.

In almost less time than it takes to tell, the cargos of our bembers shattered military objectives in the city and started hundreds of fires.

The second instalment of our serial story takes us again susburgain on the way to Hemburg, in daylight; this time with the United States Army Air Perce. In these attacks some four thousand American flying men (including fighter escerts) went into action.

Over the target the Americans found an enermous amount of make rising from the fires caused in the R.A.F. night raid a few hours earlier. However, they went me in and proved that there are certain kinds of Hemburgers they dent tike.

Naturally, the powers that be wanted proof positive of the effectiveness of this almost non-step series of Raids. By photographers secured pictures of Hamburg after the earlier Allied visits. Close study of these stills shows that up to that time much damage of Military importance was done. Objectives identified as having been theroughly blitsed in this, Germany's second largest city and biggest part, include the huge gas works, the Blohm and Vess Submarine slips, part installations, shipping, shipbuilding yards, marshalling yards, locametive sheds, and bundreds of factories.

Altogether, it is estimated that in the whole series of raids no less than seven square miles of Hunburg were laid in ruins. This includes the area which produces, or rather produced, one third of the German 5-beats in Service.

This was a locemetive sjed, a busy place in pre-blits days, butmost of these inning structures are new about as much use to the Hazis as last Sunday's newspapers.

Later instalments of our serial take us again and again with mighty air armadas of the R.A.F. by might over Bunburg, where the defences make desperate efforts to ward off the terror raining down from the skies....

Down there is a pyrotechnic display the like of which has never before been seen.

Goering visited the devastated sity of Humburg and declared that "it would be averaged". He, of course, is the man who once declated that British planes would never fly ever Germany. In one week the total temmake of bambs dropped on Germany, particularly Hamburg - by aircraft operating from Britain, exceeded twelve thousand tems. Which just goes to show that Goeing is a bad prophet.

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Houtral sources report that in eight heavy allied raids on Hamburg more than 58,000 people lost their lives and 180,000 hm lost their jobs. That's nearly a quarter of a million German war-warkers less than a week ago. A brilliant tribute to Allied Knights of the Air.
