## BOSTONS OVER FRANCE.

The Bestens of Bomber Germand are off on a tea party over Northern France. They throw their shadows on the green fields of England and, with their distinctive tails held high, keep their rendesvous with the escerting spitfires flying high above them, as they wing their way across the Channel. The target is Abbeville acrodreme. An interesting point of the actual attack is the fact that when the bembs explode you'll see a clearly defined ground wave. It's this wave that is so enermously destructive when bembs fall in built up areas. New watch, centre right.

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That's worth seeing again, as it's believed to be the first time that a ground wave has been recorded on film. Instructive to us, but not so interesting for the Jerries in the dispersal areas, gun positions and on the runways of Abbeville acrodrame.

R.A.F. Crows sum it up as "a piece of cake". Further down the ceast and about 40 miles inland is the town of Rennes. Another Boston formation goes in low, clipping the tree tops on their way to homb a Naval stores depet. These smaxing pictures take you right inside the aircraft as they head for the central distributing store for U-Boats.

These buildings rashing towards us are what the briefing officer teld them to look out for. In a second or two you'll see a puff of dust and smoke blow out as a delayed-action bemb digs its way in.

A second wave of Bostons is attacking with instantaneous bombs from several bundred feet.

Flak holes in a Boston wing. While there was no fighter opposition, ground defences put up an intense barrage. Some of our pilots look on raids like these as cashy jobs - well - they ought to know.
