## ELEPHANTS AID ALLIES.

Our cameraman Oscar Bevill out East has turned in this story of working elephants employed in heavy duty jebs on the Burmas Front. He tells how these animals filehed from the Burmese by the Japs at the time of the occupation, are being systematically snatched back from under the very noses of the enemy by elephant rastlers...Burmese bushmen who raid the stockades and bring back big drives of these well trained animals. Skilfally taught to drag, push, roll and lift heavy legs, they can each do in a single day the work of between two and three hundred occlies. After setting up a ramp they proceed with tusks and trunk to lead the legs onto a lorry. It's an education to watch them manipulating big baulks of timber with the skill of a lumberjack and the case of a travelling crane.

The elephant has brain as well as brawn. Here's that celessal muscle power of his being used to haul an anti-aircraft gun up a steep slope. It tons of Bofors gun between the two of them. A tough job but these lads will make the grade.

A cow elephant takes her newly bern infant down to the river to baths. The little feller is not yet 24 hours old but he's cut out to be a bauler and a cusher like his dad.
