DAY AND NIGHT.

Allied planners of the air war on Germany meet in Conference. Air Chief Marshal Leigh Mallory, Invasion Air Chief and General Butler, Deputy C. in C. have Europe as a background, while other high officers study the plans for pending operations by the Combined Allied Expeditionary Force.

Round the clock blows at Hitler's West Wall are reaching new levels of intensity. This is the Pas de Calais area, (which has come to be known as the rocket-gun coast) being ploughed by Bostons and Mitchells. Shuttle-service raids which place military objectives across the Channel under almost constant air attack.

Where the day raids leave off the night attacks begin. Four-engined bombers of the R.A.F. strike the fires of SIEBELPFUE. Well over a thousand aircraft making two separate attacks on the ball-bearing factories in Hitler's rooking Reich. Another blazing battlefield is left behind by British airmen who have long held the distinction of being the men who go into Germany by night and bring the war right on to German soil.
