ALLIES WINGED: WARFARE.

The War in the West gives Allied airmen their great chance to tear the vitals out of the enemy. Fighters of the

American Eighth Air Force range far behind the battle line, shooting up German communications and transport. The few enemy planes that try to interfere are hurled from the sky.

Another German plane joins the scrap-heap that once was the Luftwaffe.

Priority targets are enemy supplies and transport. These have already been pounded to the limits of endurance, and

the Allied Air Forces are out to see to it that these limits are passed. One of the R.A.F.'s most deadly weapons for this purpose is the rocket-firing typhoon, seen here attacking targets near Brest Harbour.

The immense striking power and great accuracy of the Typhoon make it the terror of the enemy. It takes all targets in its stride; Gun emplacements, ~~xxxx~~ motor transport, troop concentrations and ammunition dumps. Watch these rockets as they leave the plane.

More rockets plunge earthwards. These Typhoons are most deadly against tanks, as Von Kluge found to his cost, when he had over a hundred destroyed during the first ~~xxxx~~ black twenty-four hours of his ill-fated counter-attack against the Americans.

The tempo of destruction gathers speed. R.A.F. Bomber Command sends out a force of heavies to blast enemy communications, and so makes movement of German troops to the battle area impossible. Down go the target indicators, while the bombers make ready to strike. Then comes the signal to release bombs. The attack is well concentrated and the target area takes a heavy pounding.

The bombers turn for home, leaving a trail of wrecked communications to add to the ever mounting chaos of the German armies in the West. With the savagery of despair, Hitler hurls his V I against Southern England. But the R.A.F.'s fighters have a short way with flying bombs, as the automatic camera shows.
