In the Chapel of Our Lady Undercroft at Canterbury, the late Archbishop lies in state. At the funeral on the following day, the Archbishop of York says the prayers.

The Dean of Canterbury receives from the Chaplain, the late Archbishop's Pasteral Staff, (which had laim on the catafalque) and takes it to the High Altar. To his right, at the top of the steps, is Archbishop Lord Lang of Lambeth, predecessor of Dr. Temple, whese eightieth birthday coincided with this solemm day. It is only two and a half years since Dr. Temple was translated from York and enthroned as 96th Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of All England. During that short time, he has preved himself to be a truly great leader of the Church and his name is henoured by men and women, young and eld, in all walks of life.

And so on the shoulders of eight sergeant majors and staff sergeants of the Buffs, the coffin is borne in procession from the High Altar steps, through the Screen, to the West Door of the Cathedral.

The procession included the Archdeacons and Bishops of the Diocese and clerical and lay officers of the Province....And new, the last rites are complete, except for the private commital in Cloister Garth, and the Require for the repose of the soul of the Archbishop sung in the Cathedral on All Souls' Day.
