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ENGLAND DOWNS N.S.W.

England's Rugby League Team draws 50,000 spectators for its tangle with New South Wales at Australia's Sydney cricket ground. And the crowd is on its toes as England, with three-quarter Batten prominent, work the ball down towards the Aussie goal. But New South Wales comes back fighting when the five-eight, Devery, whips the ball to Lisle, sending the home team away in grand style.

Lisle, White and Ron Bailey take part in this grand passing rush. Then Glue, on the inside, takes the pass from Bailey and touches down between the goal posts for the first try of the match.

It's a tense moment for the crowd as Jorgensen kicks the goal and gives New South Wales an early lead of five to nil.

At halftime, the scores stand at 7-nil in the home side's favour. And now here comes the disputed try by Owens of England when a knock-on was claimed. Watch carefully.

Now we'll slow it up for you to show what really did happen. Owens, England, and Devery, New South Wales, rush for the ball in the air. Yes it's Devery's hand which is knocking the ball - not ON but BACK, since he's a New South Wales player. Owen's gets the luck of the bounce and scores nicely.
