Death rell: a 23 yearid ex-airman. A veteran of 35 beabing missions, he was killed on the first day of his demob leave. Seventeen people were injured.

Off the Kent Geast, our air reporter shows how the treacherous Goodwins Claim another victim. Split into halves by the gale is America's 7,000 ten Helena Medjesha. Aboard is a £750,000 Cargo. Helpless, at the sea's mercy, this is the death of what was once a ship.

A broken halk, the Helma Modjeska revives the Deadly legend of the Goodwin Sands.

From the Midlands our Camerange report the worst floods in living menery. In the heart of Manchester, shollen rivers tell a tale of towns isolated, reads made impassable, rails cut and ruined farms. 1 inch of rain over an acre of ground weighs 100 tens, and rain fell on the Manchester district continuously for 30 days. For each house, a major tragedy. Ruined furnishings, broken walls and flooded basements. Damage runs inte a million pounds and many hundreds of families are humeless.
