From the Midlands our Cameramen report the worst floods in living memory. In the heart of Manchester, shollen rivers tell a tale of towns isolated, reads made impassable, rails cut and ruined farms. I inch of rain over an acre of ground weighs 100 tens, and rain fell on the Manchester district continuously for 30 days. For each house, a major tragedy. Ruined furnishings, broken walls and flooded basements. Damage runs into a million pounds and many hundreds of families are homeless.
