Lord Justice Lawrence, head of the Tribunal, and spectacled Mr. Justice Birkett are back have after their ten-menth part in the world's biggest trial. The day before this, they sentenced twelve Maxi leaders to death. With a rest and a haliday to look forward to, they leave with Lord Jewitt and Lord Chief Justice Goddard.

Epilogue to a ten-menth trial. The judgments are delivered. Twenty one would-be Fuebrers know their fate. From acquitted Fery Freis von Paper to life-centenced Rudalf Hess, they say their mutual farewells. For the rest- the rope.

Outside in the streets of Nuremberg, the ene-time capital city of Nazism hears and reads a new message. Tyrasmy is gene, and fear and war. They read - but do they learn?

Until the sentences are carried out, guards patrel the tem. There must be no last minute rescues and no playing up the legand of the Masi martyre.

In this triumph of fastice, a word of public thanks to the British team of presecutors. Among them Attorney General Sir Hartley Shawcross and Sir David Maxwell Pyfe. It is the end at Murambers.
