WORLD AT YOUR ELBOW

At Australia's Sydney Stadium, British light weight champion Ronnie James meets Australian Tommy Burns. Burns wears a white stripe round his waist.

Using his familiar weaving tactics and concentrating his attack on the body, Welshman James made all the pace. And for the first three rounds challenger Burns was in trouble.

The contest ended in round four. Pathe cameras stop the action and make referee Wallis' decision clear. Burns dropped James with a right cross to the jaw and then hit him again while he was still down.

For the first time in a hundred and ninety five fights, James wins on a foul. Later he said that Australian fighters have no boxing science. If this were a sample it looks as if James was right.

South Africa's colonial Calm goes west when the natives of Cape Town stage their annual Coen's Carnival. Hordes of urchins cheer them on, and the beaux and belles of the district dress up in brilliant silks for the parade through the streets.

Finishing point of the march is the Cape Town Stadium where rival Coen troops take part in singing contests for cups and prizes. Three days of hilarity celebrate one hundred and twenty years of freedom from slavery.

In New York's Madison Square Garden a crowd of fifteen thousand gives a warm reception to three cool customers. They call themselves the Bruisers.....and you can guess why.

Serious business of the evening was the twenty third annual Silver Skates competition. A two hundred and twenty yard sprint gives the youngsters a chance. And they really battle for the coveted prize. The men's Senior Championships (two miles along the slippery, sharp-curved course) attracts a large field - but it's not large for long. Winning time - seven minutes, sixteen seconds.
