MINERS NEED D.P. LABOUR

From Europe's one-and-a-half million stateless people British industry must draw 160,000 workers. Today they are "Displaced Persons." Once they were Poles, Italians, Yugoslavs, Czechs, Balts. The first 30,000 go into British coalpits, battleground for our industrial survival. What does the miner think? Here is their Union Secretary, Arthur Horner.

SPEECH

The Government, Trade Unions, Newspapers, have debated the problem of foreign labour. It raises vital issues for every citizen and for every worker in British industry. Based upon Cardiff, the Pathe industrial survey team spent a week in the areas most deeply concerned - the mining communities of Wales. Up the Rhondda valley, we went to Pannoglass the home of miner Hector Bartlett. Here is his opinion on foreign labour.

SPEECH

In the miners' homes - at work - and in their clubs the controversy grows. In Pemyraig, up the valley near Tonypandy, our reporters were invited to the meeting place of the local miners' Lodge. These were the opinions we recorded.

To South Wales, (from the docks and heavy industry of Cardiff to the smallest pits in distant valleys) Foreign labour is the biggest topic since coal nationalisation. DPs will come to your town. When they do, what will you say?
