The very latest in fashion comes from these shapely glamour girls. The thing to do is to stick on any coloured, odd-shaped, smartly designed silken patch, on whatever parts of you you want other people to look at. On the legs they save coupons. On the face they give the old "come hither" look.

You won't look as if you've caught measles - the glamour patches are made in different sizes. Whatever will they think of next?

Introducing - the biggest camera lens in the newsreel industry, operated by cameraman Rickard. In the coming sports season this 56" lens will bring to the screen the sporting incidents that no other camera can see. At the Thames Head of the River Race - the 56" lens has its try out.
