THE TICHBORNE CURSE

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In this Mampshire village, in the year 1150, the curse of the Tichbernes began. On her deathbed Lady Mabel Tichberne told her family, that unless each year on that day, they give the villagers one gallen of flour, the house of Tichberne would crumble away. To this day a Latin benediction marks the ceremony.

Sir Anthony Doughty Tichborne, the 14th barenet, tells how the curse was only marrowly averted.

Once the dole was stopped. A generation of seven sons was followed by seven daughters, and the Manor House arumbled. Since then the Tichbernes have been more careful and the curse is just a legend.

To every adult - one gallon of flour, to every child - half a gallon. That was the command of Lady Tichborns.

5,000 B.Us from all parts of the country were sent to Sir Anthony so that the dole (ancient in custom, charitable in intent) should be continued.

In country life and tradition, curses have a longer history than rationing. The wish of Lady Tichberne in 1150 is still a command to Sir Anthony-Desughty Tichberne in 1947.
