These are the field of "Britain after-the-flood" Spring of 1947. Already weeks late with their Spring sowings farmers now face the threat of ruined hervests. Leading the way with emergency methods is Northampton's flying farmer Josiah Tomkins. From a Miles acrovan his sedden land is sown with wheat. Twenty across are sprayed as the plane flies at 75 miles per hour 50 ft above the ground. From the air four bushels are used per acro, against three on land.

Josiah Tomkins says, that on fields like these not even the most modern tracter could have operated. Sprayed from the plane, one ton of seed per trip; is evenly sown in a 18 yard wide lane. It took two hours to finish 20 acros. Many farmers say this sowing method, though revolutionary, is too expensive. If that is the case, why not give government aid, or use service planes, for the job.

Over in Manchester we pick out the event of the day at the meeting of the Buckshee Wheelers. The 1,000 metres international cycle sprint. Taking part - British amateur sprint champion Reg Harris, Helland's champ Cor Bijster, and the two Manchester wheelers Dove and Bannister. At the half distance, Herris was well in the lead.

And that's the way it stays right till the end. Reg Harris omes in first, fellowed by Bannister, and Bijster, 3rd. To ex-desert rat Harris of Manchester Wheelers another eyeling victory.
