From Texas City, the final report on the aftermath of disaster. For days, this once thriving American town was a blazing inferno, begun when a French ship blow up in the harbour. More than 400 citizens perished. This is the scene after four days of explosions and fires. With the pyre of their City still burning, survivors held memorial services. There was a typical Texas town of homes, churches, theatres, stores. Today, death is everywhere - but there is also life and the will to rebuild. From its ruins, Texas City and its people are struggling back.

At Athens aerodrome, Princess Catherine of Greece meets her British husband-to-be Major, Richard Braden. The 35 year old Major from Bickley, Kent, flew to the Greek capital from Irak for his wedding.

The bride's brother King Paul I, wearing half-mourning for his late brother King George of the Hellenes was best man. The couple were married according to Greek and Anglican rites. 34 year old Princess Catherine's gown was cut in classic Greek style with a full tulle veil. They will live in Irak.

A Pathe air report on the sequel to a 75 mile an hour gale. Off the coast of Cornwall six miles from Penzance, the grand old battleship Warspite lies aground at Prussia Cove. Stripped of her guns, she was on her way to the Clyde for breaking up. Turning north, our reporter heads out for Ferintosh, Glamorgan. There, off the rocky South Wales coast, lies the broken hulk of the 7,000 ton steamship Sontampa. Headed for Newport for refitting the gale tore her into three parts. Her crew of 40, 21 of them from Middlesborough, perished. A second tragedy was yet to come. The Humber lifeboat, Edward Prince of Wales, you see it here overturned on the rocks below, put out and was lost with all hands in a vain attempt at rescue. The total death toll was 46 in this 12 hour drama off the coasts of Britain - the worst double sea tragedy for years.
