At Wembley - the Amateur Boxing Championships of Great Britain. This was the most exciting fight - welterweight Johnny Ryan, in white, of the Army, against Tommy Glanville of Slough. Ryan ducked most of his opponent's punches, and it wasn't long before the boxing Sergeant Major had proved his superiority. In these ringside close-ups, the Welsh boy shows that he is still top of the amateur welterweights.

Hammering away with damaging body blows and hits to the face, Ryan knocks Glanville down for a count of six.

Third and last round. Glanville is tired out, and can't take much more. With a battery of blows, Ryan puts him down again. Johnny Ryan of Wales is champion for another year.

The end of an Empire Mission - the Royal Family say goodbye to Capetown and South Africa. The scene as the King and Queen and the Princesses bid farewell to the Dominion is the same as it has been every day during the 10 week tour; cheering crowds and tumultuous welcomes - everywhere in the Union the Royal family won the hearts of the South African people. And as they boarded the battleship Vanguard for the return trip, they took their leave from the people of the youngest dominion with affectionate regret.

To the Royal family it has been no holiday. Their tradition of service was fully maintained during an arduous programme. To Britain, it has brought export orders totalling a quarter of a million pounds. As Vanguard drew away, the crowd broke into song with "Will ye no come back again."

In Roskilde, near Copenhagen, the people of Denmark line the streets for the funeral of King Christian X. Heads of European States march in the procession. Symbol of his country's resistance to the German invader, the King died at the age of 76. This month he would have completed the 35th year of his reign. The tall military figure of the King was often to be seen riding or walking the streets of Copenhagen. His simple dignity and high sense of duty endeared him to all his subjects, and made him a popular figure, not only in Denmark, but in the countries he visited. The late King is succeeded by his son, King Frederick IX.
