In Paris, British middleweight champion, Vince Hawkins of Eastleigh battles it out with France's Gustave Degaube. Hawkins was pinned on to the ropes in the third round. Degaube (with white waist band) hits out with hooks to the body.

Prior to the Paris fight Hawkins was due to box Marcel Cerdan for the European championship. In his showing against Degaube, Hawkins doesn't seem to be ready for that yet.

Hawkins manages to duck one of the Frenchman's blows. Although the Eastleigh boxer tried hard in the last two rounds, Degaube, France's No.2 middleweight, proved far superior. He gained a clear points victory.

This defeat has cost Vince Hawkins a crack at the European title.
