Frankfurt, Germany

In Frankfurt, Germany - a Pathe reporter met Carl Fischer. He's an artist. People call him the mouth painter - for Carl has no hands to paint with and no stumps to which artificial arms could be fitted. Injured in an air raid, 46 year old Fischer determined to use his mouth in place of his missing hands. Notice how he controls his brush.

Today Carl Fischer can claim to have perfected his method. These are some examples of his work. Ingenuity and endurance have overcome a paralyzing disability.

Windsor, Canada

Across the river from Detroit, U.S.A. lies Windsor in Canada. The Detroit-Windsor tunnel is alive these days with cars and buses carrying eager Detroit housewives to the grocery stores of the neighbouring Ontario City. The women are off on shopping sprees in Canadian stores. Since the price control on foodstuffs was lifted, food prices in the United States have rocketed. In Canada prices are much lower. A pound of steak in Detroit costs five shillings - in Windsor it's half the price. And it's the same with nearly all other foods.

Canada allows American women to take one pounds' worth of food out of the country. American customs add a few cents in import duties. That's how Detroit women fight against high food prices.

Southampton

The "Queen Elizabeth" steamed into Southampton on this trip she had 143 American bankers aboard. Waiting to meet them was Chancellor Hugh Dalton. American reporters had warned us that the head of the delegation - U.S. Treasury Chief John Snyder - was a tough subject to interview. At Southampton, he gave everybody a surprise.
