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Acres of ripening rice are underwater - a major 200 501 blow to Japan's already limited food supply. In the country's worst disaster since Hiroshima, two hundred thousand people have been made homeless. For the camera, it was quite a task to find the lighter side of a world at peace.

Certainly, the U.N.O. discussions were not becoming any less aerimonious. Forcefully, Britain's Hester MeNeil replied to Andrei Vishinsky's comparison of Mr. Churchill with Hitler. Defending Britain's war time Premier, Mr. McNeil said:

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In a forthright analysis of Soviet policy, Mr. McMeil went on to say:

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It may be that cards-en-the-table diplomacy would make the greatest contribution to International understanding. But the Assembly will permit me to say that Mr. Winston Churchill's record against fascism is better than the record of any Communist I knew in any country in that fight."

In a forthright analysis of Soviet Policy, Mr. NoWell went on to say:-

"We harbour no hostility to Russia or to any nation.
Our designs are plain, our doors are open. Our Press,
our people and our Parliaments are free, and I repeat
that for these purposes the United Nations is at once
the main spring and the finest instrument of our
purposes We have nothing to hide, we are willing to
en-operate, to try to secure that objective to which
I have just alluded."
