Dagenham, Essex.

15,000 Dagenham workers take a well-earned break. To welcome a visitor they are making British Ford cars for America, and their guest is Henry Ford, grandson of the American motor pioneer. His is the quarter-millionth vehicle - the first of 6,000 cars and vans for immediate export. Britain will get in return more than one million pounds in dollars. Helped by his workers at the big Ford plant, America's car King promotes international trade.

Newcastle-on-Tyne

H.M.S. Nelson's silver bell is returned to its Newcastle donors. Through the city's busy streets a naval guard escorts the battleship's watch signal. Tyneside citizens line the route to City Hall. Twenty years ago, the people of Newcastle (then in the grip of industrial depression) wanted to pay their tribute to Britain's navy. Their copper coins paid for 7,000 ounces of silver to give the Nelson the world's largest silver bell.

Through 30,000 war miles, Newcastle's bell remained on the ship. Its return today marks the end of Nelson's fighting career. With civic honours, Lord Mayor McCutcheon receives the navy's keepsake which will be stored in the Laing Art Gallery. Until a new Nelson sails the seas, it will remain Newcastle's watch bell.

Canterbury

To nine Canterbury schoolchildren, "six bells" has no naval association. For them it spells a 15 foot ladder - trip to the tower of St. Alphege Church. There, every Sunday night, 13 year-old Joy Crisp and Cynthia Harper (who isn't quite tall enough) join friends to add their peals to Britain's city of bells.

One of the church bells dates back before the reformation. Age probably adds to its "near half-ten" weight, heavy enough to make anyone puff.

Minneapolis

Bent also on improving his performance as a bell-ringer is heavyweight Joe Louis. Failure to knock the customary seven bells out of challenger Joe Walcott has made the champion take up serious training.
