WATER JETS CLEAR MINEFIELDS

Death still lingers on long stretches of Britain's sunniest beaches. Pengiful water jots are new swinging into action on the sands around Bideford Bay in a final wine clearing operation. A training area for D-Day assault troops, Saunton in Deven (once a famed holiday spet) is still barred to visitors in the third post-war Baster. Buried deep among the dumes, all explosives are brought to the surface by the force of the water.

Unable to draw supplies from the Atlantic, low pressure hoses pump a daily one million gallons of water from a nearby stream to the high pressure unit on the beach. On this scene of many warting combined operations, British troops and German P.O.Ws now work together to clear the debris of battle.

Sappers are in charge of the clearance work - which will make Britain's beaches safe for summer bathing.
