100,000 MER GREAT MOODS

The swellen Columbia River bursts through a railway embankment to sweep out of existence the whole town of Vanport, Gregon. Righteen thousand are rendered homeless within the hour. Scores perish in the fleedwaters despite the efforts of quickly mobilized rescue workers. The railway embankment was considered a safe wall against the raging river which now bears houses away like matchwood.

So brief was the warning that hundreds of families had only time to screenble to precerious safety on their own roofs.

The Red Cross is immediately at work to register, clothe and feed the thousands of refugees who have lost all but count thouselves lucky to have saved their lives.

Dykes are strengthened as the waters super down to the coast. In Pertland, Oregon, the flood great passes thirty feet. Rail transpert is dislocated as the railread station is inundated....yet thirty thimsand people are safely evacuated from the town, to swell the total of the homeless (in an area which includes British Columbia) to over a hundred thousand.

Divers centimes the search for the yet unnumbered victims of the worst flood in the history of America's Pacific coast.

Reeftops give perilous temporary shelter to scores unable to flee in time. The full resources of the federal government, mobilized by the President, swing into action to save thousands more. The Red Gross is already at work to register, to clothe, to feed the young, the old, the poor.

Throughout the Pacific Northwest sixty-five thousand are already homeless. The damage passes seventy-five million dollars. Dikes are reinforced and the army orders the evacuation of a hundred and twenty miles of the Columbia watershed. In Rurahad Portland, the flood crest passes thirty feet and the still rises. Already the railroad station is inundated.
