In Berlin, following a was meeting of anti-Communists held before the Reichstag building in the British sector, crowds, returning homewards to the Russian Zone, clash with Communist police. Scaling the Brandenburger Gate, German youths attempt to haul down the Russian flag and Soviet troops open fire.

Bussian bullets kill one person and wound thirty including the youth who tore down the flag.

In Prague, the sorrew signal of the half-most flags brings an endless procession of mourners to the lying in state of President Eduard Benes.

Hour by hour the stream of human grief flows past the dead statesman whose less is mourned throughout the whole of the free world.

For the second time in a few menths the great crowds assemble to watch the last journey of a national here. Eduard Benes follows his friend, Jan Maseryk.
